Gardens of the Fox Cities is a 501 (c)(3) non-profit 38 acre public botanical garden. The gardens are designed to offer changing patterns of natural beauty throughout the year. Most of the plants featured are native to Wisconsin.

1. Veteran's Memorial Garden is a Living Memorial for future generations to remember the contributions of all Veterans to our natural history, and their efforts and sacrifice for the cause of freedom. Sponsor: a gift from Doug & Myrt Ogilvie.

2. Entry Gardens are two mirrored gardens along the front walkway and are a spectacular show of color, texture and shape. Sponsor: the families of Andrew & David Ogilvie and Pierce Manufacturing.

3. Native Rose Garden might fool some people, who expect it to be filled with roses, when instead the garden features wild strawberry, black chokeberry and prairie smoke. Sponsor: Piper Jaffray in honor of Cyril and Jean Wolff.

4. All-Seasons Garden showcases plants with year long interest including a weeping white pine, paper bark maple and the autumn colors of sumac. Sponsor: Doug & Myrt Ogilvie.

5. Seasonal Garden highlights new unusual and hardy annuals that you can plant in your own garden. Sponsor: Wisconsin Energy Foundation.

6. Selle Garden of Roses was designed in the theme of an English Rose Garden and features hybrid tea roses, climbing roses, shrub roses, floribunda roses and grandiflora roses. Ballerina sculpture by *Dallas Anderson*. Sponsor: Bill & Ruth Selle Family.

7. Serenity Butterfly Garden is planted with flowers that attract Monarch butterflies as well as many other species of Lepidoptera. The Iron Butterfly sculpture created by *Iron Images*, and the Garden Kaleidoscope created by *Bob Anderson* are sponsored by Rosemary Trettin.

8. Wisconsin Water Feature is a formal water garden consisting of three connected tiers of ponds, featuring native plantings, waterfalls and bridges. Sponsor: Fox Cities Convention & Visitors Bureau

9. Native Wildflower Garden showcases a wide variety of wildflowers native to Wisconsin. Sponsor: Secura Insurance.

10. Fragrance Garden offers the visitor a dual sensory adventure in this garden which includes beautiful, aromatic perennials and annuals. Sponsor: Martin Luther Koehneke.

11. Plant All-Stars Garden contains plants that are best-suited for the growing conditions in northeast Wisconsin and was funded through a grant from the Stanley Smith Horticultural Trust.

12. Foundation Gardens are four gardens that surround the foundation of the Scheig Learning Center. Each of the four gardens has an emphasis, shade, woodland or perennial plants. Established in 2000 they include the Dorothy Stoflet Garden, the Ruth Mueller Garden, and the Jeanette Oberstadt Garden.

13. Family Garden is located behind the Children's Garden and is based on a photograph taken of a Fox Valley Cottage Garden in the late 1900s.

14. Marvin's Garden is our youth summer gardening programs for ages 5 - 12. We meet once a week for nine weeks to tend to our garden plots and engage in hands-on lessons and activities.

15. UW-Extension Youth Garden directed by **Outagamie County UW-Extension**. Outreach program for children in the area, including Boys & Girls Clubs, 4-H, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts.

16. Herb Garden is designed and planted to educate the community about the abundant use herb.

17. Prairie Display Garden is planted in memory of Althea Doman by her family and friends.

18. Prairie Rose Display is planted in memory of Frank & Hildegard Bauhs by their family.

19. Oak Savanna (Wisconsin Prairie) Garden is primarily grassland, sparsely populated by trees, mainly oaks, mixed with other species. Sponsor: Wisconsin Garden Club, this garden features two *Hawthornes* planted to commemorate the September 11, 2001 tragedy.

20. South Acreage & Wetlands were developed to help visitors understand that a marsh is a complex and dynamic ecological system, containing a diversity of plants and animals species living together as a community.

21. Scheig Learning Center opened the summer of 1996. The building was designed by Charles Montooth a Taliesin Architect in Spring Green, Wisconsin. Taliesin is Frank Lloyd Wright's Architectural Prairie School of Design which incorporates nature into the design.
